God gave His life for us, so He could give His life to us, so He could live His life through us!

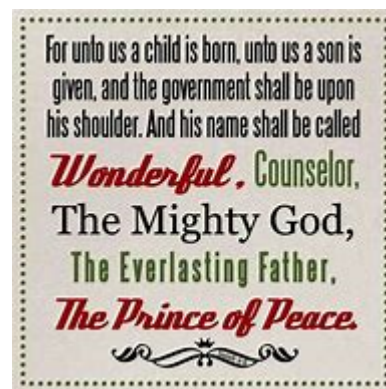
I encourage you, if you are a follower of Jesus to meditate on all that Jesus has done for us! If you have never made a commit-

In spite of myself, the lump returned to my throat and the tears welled up in my eyes again. I was sure that a better man than Daddy had never walked the earth. I started remembering all the times he had gone out of his way for Mommy and me, and many others. 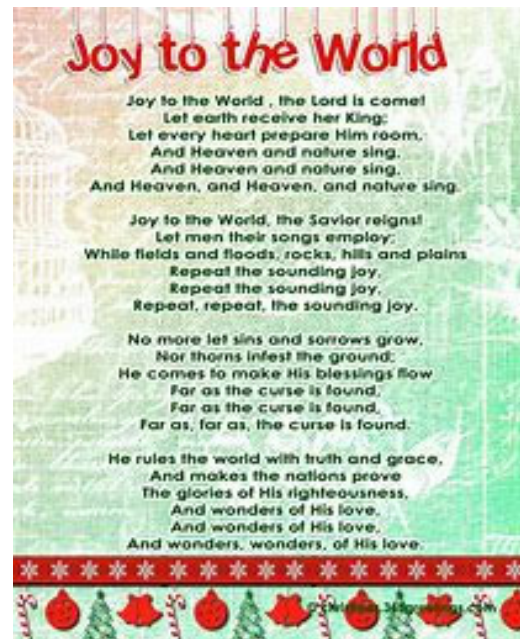
Mrs. Jensen nodded and said, "Thank you, Brother Miles. I don't have to say, May the Lord bless you, I know for certain that He will."
